# His Holiness Catholicos Karekin I Passes Away

n Tuesday, June 29, 1999, Armenians the world over suffered an immeasurable loss. His Holiness Karekin I Sarkissian, Supreme Patriarch and Catholicos of all Armenians, passed into eternal rest after a long period of severe illness.

H. H. Karekin I was elected in 1995 by the National Ecclesiastical Assembly as the 131st Catholicos to occupy the throne of St. Gregory the Illuminator. He served as Catholicos of the Great House of Cilicia for 18 years before taking the throne at the See of Holy Etchmiadzin where he guided

the Armenian Church and the Armenian nation with a profound sense of devotion.

During his last visit to Fresno in February, 1996, H.H. Karekin I was the guest of the Armenian Studies Program and spoke to a capacity crowd at the Satellite Student Union.

News of his passing despite a long and serious illness, was no less tragic. "As much as you prepare for something that you know is inevitable, there was nevertheless a feeling of despair when we lost His Holiness," said Mark Shirin, Arch Deacon at the Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church in Fresno. "He was not just a great church leader, he was a great writer, a scholar, an orator, a

theologian, an ecumenist. He was someone who captured the hearts of a lot of young Armenian-American people," Shirin said.

His Holiness Karekin I was born Neshan Sarkissian on August 27, 1932. He attended an Armenian elementary school near his native village of Kessab, Syria and in 1946 was admitted to the Theological Seminary of the Armenian Catholicate of Cilicia. In 1949 he was ordained as a deacon before graduating with high honors in 1952. His Holiness took the name Karekin when ordained as a celibate priest on Sept. 28, 1952. He was renamed Karekin in memory of the late Catholicos H.H. Karekin I Hovsepian.

H.H. Karekin I worked tirelessly to not only develop and nurture the spirituality of the Armenian people, but to unify them as a nation as well. He also dedicated much of his time to make Armenians throughout the Diaspora feel as much a part of the Armenian Church as those who worshipped at Etchmiadzin themselves. Many believe H.H. Karekin I had much more to accomplish in his already accomplished life. "His tenure was too short, he really didn't get to accomplish all that he wanted to," said Ben Krikorian, chairman of the parish council at St. Paul Armenian Church in Fresno.

In preparation for the celebration of the 1700th anniversary of the adoption of Christianity in Armenia, H.H. Karekin I oversaw the renovation of numerous churches and monasteries that had previously been in a state of disrepair.

Also under his direction, a new assemblage of future spiritual leaders studied at the Gevorgian Seminary which had been completely renovated. The efforts of H.H. Karekin I also led to the expansion of the Center for Christian Education and Preaching and the opening of the St. Mesrop Seminary in Oshakan.

Thanks in large part to the prolific writings of H.H. Karekin I, the press of the Mother See was greatly expanded and included a number of works authored by His Holiness.



# Fresno State Awarded Grant to Assist Armenia

r. Thomas McClanahan,
Associate Vice-President for Grants and Research, announced that Fresno State
was awarded a grant of \$104,440
for the purpose of conducting a
Faculty Development Program in
Business and Economics with
Yerevan State University under the
Newly Independent States (NIS)
College and University Partnership Program.

Fresno State professors will collaborate with Yerevan State University Professors to develop curricula in the area of business and economics.

Project director for Fresno State is Barlow Der Mugrdechian of the Armenian Studies Program, who applied for the grant, and Associate Project Director is Dr. Dickran Kouymjian, Director of the Armenian Studies Program. Project co-directors from Yerevan State University (YSU) are Rafael Matevossian, Pro-Rector (Vice President) for International Relations, and Grigor Gharibian, Dean


of the School of Business. Der Mugrdechian had traveled to Armenia recently to strengthen the YSU-Fresno State sister-university ties and the idea of the grant application arose out of discussions with YSU faculty.

The goal of the project is to contribute to economic and political stability in Armenia by fostering educational reform in the area of business/economics at Yerevan State University. The program will enhance the expertise of educators and business practitioners in the basic business and economic principles that underlie all modern market economies. The program has been designed to facilitate Armenia's development as a technologically advanced, democratic, and free-enterprise society.

Modern business practices will be applied to real world problems by inviting local business practitioners to the Yerevan State University campus for seminars, workshops, and demonstration projects.



Just as a reminder, membership dues are currently being collected. They are \$10 this semester. Paid members will




Twenty-one students from all over the world, including Pennsylvania, Florida, Rhode Island and California, even Russia and Armenia, were selected to participate as interns for the summer.

# **Students Delve Into History of Fresno Armenians**



here is a large Armenian community thriving in Fresno, but who were these Armenians? How did they end up

guided them through the history of the Fresno Armenians until the present day. He used a variety of techniques and materials to inspire and educate his students. There were field trips, videos, lectures, literature reading, guest speakers and much more.

in Fresno and why? These questions and much more were explored by the students of the class titled, Armenians Studies 120T- Armenians in Fresno. The two-day long class (held on Sept. 17, and 18, 1999) gave the students a unique opportunity to study this unusual group of people. Professor Barlow Der Mugrdechian of the Armenian Studies Program took the students back in time to the first arrival of the Armenians in Fresno. He then

Armenian community in old Fresno (which was drastically different from what we see today). It is incredible to believe that the Armenians did not only survive all the discrimination directed toward them, but also rose and aspired to be more. We visited the Ararat Armenian Cemetery in Fresno and read the names and the stories of the first Armenians who arrived here. It was interesting to see the


graves of many of the famous Armenians that we had heard and read about including Jonathan Sinanian, who was the first Armenian born in California in 1884. Many of the pioneer farmers and merchants of Fresno were the Armenians buried at the Ararat Armenian Cemetery. We read literature from many people including William Saroyan, the famous Armenian-American writer who was born and died in Fresno. He wrote about his life in the growing Armenian community.

I particularly enjoyed the walk we took through what used to be "Armenian Town," but now is located in the heart of downtown Fresno. Prof. Der Mugrdechian provided each student with a map of the old city revealing where Armenian houses, businesses and churches once stood. We walked around the historical area. It was interesting to see the changes that had taken place. Many of the structures were gone because they were torn down to make way for parking lots, stores, new buildings, etc. Some old historical houses and businesses are still left.

One of the highlights was when we visited the Hye Quality Bakery, owned by Sammy and Paula Ganimian, (one of the Armenian businesses that has remained) and saw authentic Armenian bread being made. We saw the entire process of bread being produced from the mixing of the dough to final product being packaged. Although the process of making the bread has changed, it has still kept up with tradition. All the students, including myself, gladly sampled the Cracker Bread (Parag-Hatz) and

the Hye Roller bread as it came out of the oven. It was warm and delicious.

After our interesting visit to the Hye Quality Bakery, we walked over to the Holy Trinity burned down. In 301 AD Armenians were the first to accept Christianity as their official state religion and they have always remained strong Christians. The church itself is an architecturally beautiful build-

# First Ever Pan-Armenian Games Provide Lifelong Memories

his summer I had the chance to go to Armenia to play basketball in the first Pan-Armenian World Games. Ed Erganian, Ara Karkazian, Haig Saghdejian, and I were chosen from Fresno's Homenetmen Sassoun Chapter. Players on teams representing the cities of Los Angeles, Glendale, San Diego, San Francisco and Fresno were assigned by the Armenian Council General in Los Angeles. Our teams consisted of an all-star team from California's Homenetmen. In our travel group there were about 150 athletes and coaches comprised of two men's and one women's basketball teams, one men's and two women's volleyball teams and several individual track and field competitors.

The Pan-Armenian Games were held in Yerevan, Armenia starting on August 28, 1999 and ending on Sept. 5, 1999. The games were organized by the government of Armenia and athletes of Armenian descent were eligible. There were athletes from all over the world that participated in the games. Athletes received medals in basketball, soccer, volleyball, tennis, track and field, along with chess. This event was a very popular event in Armenia. At the opening ceremony there were more than 25,000 people on hand to watch. Throughout the city there were posters advertising the

games in every store window. Both the opening and closing ceremonies, along with some of the games, were broadcast on local television. to play basketball, I realized basketball would not be the only objective. This was my first trip out of the country and it was an experi-

Our team placed sixth out of 24 teams. We also received a reward and trophy for sportsmanship and team play at the closing ceremony. The Armenian General Benevolent Union of team from Los Angeles won the basketball championship. The women's basketball team from Los Angeles placed second.

Even though I went to Armenia

ence that I will never forget. From the time that we arrived in Yerevan to the time we had to leave, we were treated like superstars. The bus from the airport to the Hotel Armenia was escorted by police. When we went out to eat, we got special treatment from the service staff. We never went hungry and the ice cream was to die for. Because of the strength of the American dollar, we ate like kings.

The biggest thrill of the trip was signing autographs for the lo-

cal kids. During each game I would chew a piece of gum and then pass out the rest to the kids that would come to watch us play. After the game they would bring the gum wrappers back for me to sign. The same group of kids would come to watch all of our games and their teacher came to us to ask if we could play basketball with them. The last day of the trip we went to their

school to play basketball with them. Afterward we took them out for ice cream and Coca-Cola.

It was hard to schedule sightseeing, because of our games, but we were able to go on a few trips. The trip to the Armenian Genocide Museum and Monument was the most interesting and moving experience. We went on tours

of the battle site at Sardarabad, Garni, a first century BC sun temple, and Geghart, a monastery carved out of a mountain. The churches were actually built out of a mountain and there is a lot of detailed art work on the walls - it was just amazing. No trip to Armenia would have been complete without going to Etchmiadzin. The grave of the Catholicos, H.H. Karekin Sarkissian, who recently passed away, is located just outside the front entrance of the church. It was moving to see the fresh dirt instead of a permanent headstone. I have read about these places in history books, and going to see them in person meant that much more to me. There was so much history there it was hard to comprehend it all at

I went to play basketball, but came back with a whole lot more. I got to see a new country and make new friends. Even though we did not bring home the gold medal, the consensus was that the trip was a positive one. As I reflect back on the trip and the things that I saw, I will always remember them. You only get one chance to play in the First Pan-Armenian Games and I was part of it. Maybe in two years, I will be asked to go play in the second Pan-Armenian Games. It would be interesting to see how much the country has changed and how much it has stayed the same.

# Who Will Lead the Armenian Church in the New Millennium?

hen the Catholicos of All Armenians, His Holiness Karekin I Sarkissian, passed away this summer, the Armenian Church was left without a leader. This unfortunate event forced the Armenian Church to revisit many of the issues concerned with the selection of a Catholicos. The Armenian Church has two sees, the Holy See of Etchmiadzin and the Holy See of Cilicia. Catholicos Karekin I was unique because he had been Catholicos of the Holy See of Cilicia for 18 years when he was elected to the position of Catholicos of All Armenians. That was the first time the Catholicos of All Armenians was elected from the position of Catholicos of the Holy See of Cilicia. Since his election had unique circumstances many believed that there would be many changes under Catholicos Karekin's leadership. Now the Church is required to elect a new leader.

On July 4, 1999, a meeting of the Supreme Spiritual Council and the Episcopal College was held to elect the Locum Tenens of the Catholicosate. The Locum Tenens serves as the temporary leader of the Church until an election is held. The Chancellor of the Mother See of Holy Etchmiadzin, Archbishop Nerses Bozabalyan, was elected with 24 votes. The only other clergy to receive votes were Archbishop Karekin Nersissian (10 votes) and Bishop Vigen Aykazian (1 vote).

There have been a number of important issues pertaining to the election of the 132nd Catholicos of the Holy See of Etchmiadzin. First is the date of the election. According to the Constitution of the Armenian Church, an election shall be called by the Locum Tenens six months to one year after the Catholicos's death. There is a sense of urgency in the Church to choose someone by the end of this year. There are many time sensitive issues, principally the planning for the celebration of the 1700th Anniversary of the Armenian Christianity. At the meeting of the Supreme Spiritual Council, a decision was made to hold the election of the Catholicos on October 26-31. This was a big change since the election was moved up a few months.

Another area of concern is the number of voting participants in the Assembly, which consists of 452 delegates. There are 47 bishops and 405 lay voters, theoretically one per 25,000 parishioners. There was discussion about lowering the number of lay delegates to make the whole process easier, but there were so many concerns about representation that no changes were

made. There is ongoing debate about how to determine the number of representatives each community receives at the Assembly. It is difficult to count the true number of parishioners for each area. How will the Assembly determine who counts as s parishioner? Seeing this discrepancy, some proposed a categorized system of choosing the number of votes for each community. For example, a community with 200,000 to 500,000 parishioners would get three votes and a community with 500,000 or more parishioners would get four votes.

The question is how to divide up the categories. The current system will be used since not enough people supported the proposed changes.

All bishops and archbishops are eligible to be candidates. The list of candidates for the position includes: Primate of Yerevan - Archbishop Karekin Nersissian; Primate of Karabagh - Archbishop Barkev Mardirossian; the Patriarch of Turkey Archbishop - Mesrob Mutafyan; and Primate of Moscow - Archbishop Diran Gureghian. Although most of the candidates

are interested, some are reported as not wanting the position, notably locum tenens Archbishop Bozabalyan. Aram I, Catholicos of the Holy See of Cilicia, and Primate of the Eastern Diocese of America - Archbishop Khajag Barsamian both stated that they are not candidates for the position. Most people feel Archbishop Nersissian is the front-runner since on the first ballot in 1995 election he received the most votes, 112 ahead of the closest candidate, who was Catholicos Karekin I. Many believe he would have been elected if the government at that time had not persuaded him to withdraw. The free and independent Re-

public of Armenia is at a crucial juncture in its history. The Armenian Genocide and 70 years of Soviet rule have severely depleted the number of qualified clergy. Then, there is the question of church unity. Beyond that the new Catholicos will have the responsibility of coordinating the celebrations of the 2000th anniversary of Christ's birth and the 1700th anniversary of Armenian Christianity. The importance of this upcoming election cannot be overestimated. As Armenians around the world mourn the loss of their dedicated Catholicos, they also wait to find out who will lead the Armenian Church into the next millennium.

# Earthquake Strikes Turkey

n August 17, 1999 an earthquake measuring 6.7 on the Richter scale hit the Marmara region of Turkey, killing more than 18,000 people and leaving over 40,000 homeless, with an estimated 27 Armenians dead.


Immediately after the earthquake, two of Turkey's traditional foes, Greece and Armenia, offered aid to the earthquake stricken country. At first Turkish officials denied offers of aid from Greece and Armenia. The government even went as far as to request that the shipments of blood not contain any blood from Greek donors. Once the Turkish citizens learned that the government was not accepting all the available aid, protesters began demanding the resignation of government officials. To avoid this the government began to accept all aid. The Armenian Government sent a plane that contained medicine, blankets, tents and four power generators weighing nine tons.

The Patriarchate was established in 1461 by the Sultan of the Ottoman Empire. A Patriarch was appointed to deal with the Christian population since the Ottoman Empire's government could not

and would not deal with the problems of their Christian subjects.

The Armenian Patriarchate of Constantinople sustained structural damage to its buildings. Fissures were found in the bell tower of Kumkapi built by Khrimian Hayrig and Samatyo built by Patriarch Harutiun Vahabedian and also the Sourp Prgich Hospital was damaged. The Armenian Patriarchate of Constantinople serves over 50,000 Armenians in Turkey. The estimated cost of rebuilding the churches in the Armenian Patriarchate is \$1.2 million. At the invitation of their Eminences, Archbishop Khajag Barsamian and Archbishop Vatche Hovsepian of the Eastern and Western Dioceses of the Armenian Church, His Beatitude Mesrob II will visit New York, Los Angeles and San Francisco for fund-raisers. In New York there will be a benefit concert held in St. Vartan Cathedral on October 1, 1999.

His Beatitude Mesrob II adopted three Armenian orphans who lost their families in the earthquake. The Patriarchate will take care of the children until they graduate from college. The Patriarch has also set up three funds: disaster relief; aid for the care of children and repair of the damaged property of the Armenian Patriarchate.

### Diaspora-Armenia Conference Held in Armenia

Yerevan, Armenia-Some 1,500 representatives of Armenian communities world-wide attended the opening in Yerevan on Sept. 22, 1999, of a two-day pan-Armenian conference intended to boost ties between the Republic of Armenia and the world diaspora community, Noyan Tapan and RFE/RL's Yerevan bureau reported.

Addressing delegates, President Robert Kocharian said Armenians need to set priorities in the political, economic, scientific, cultural, and other spheres and develop programs to achieve those aims. He said that the most important pannational problems facing the Armenian nation are resolving the Karabakh conflict and expediting Armenia's economic development. The Armenian Diaspora

About 1,200 representatives of Armenian communities from 50 countries of the world have arrived in Armenia to participate in this first nationwide forum. The Diaspora is represented by politicians, cultural workers, scientists, clergymen and others.

In the words of President Robert Kocharian, the conference should mark the beginning of a new, higher level of organization of the world's Armenians, reported Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty

"We need not only to ascertain our priorities in the national-political, economic, scientific, health, cultural, information and other areas, but also to put the emphasis on developing comprehensive programs for their implementation," Kocharian told the delegates.

He described the resolution of the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict and Armenia's economic development as the chief "pan-national" objectives of the world's estimated eight million Armenians, most of them living outside their historical homeland.

A synchronized translation of Armenian speeches into English, French, Russian and Spanish was available for Diaspora delegates, reflecting the large geographical span of the communities they represent. The main Armenian communities abroad are concentrated in the United States, Russia, France, the Middle East and South America.

The conference is expected to adopt two statements: one of a general character and another on Nagorno-Karabakh. Kocharian also stressed that cooperation does not imply re-organization of the already existing structures, but these structures must get actively involved in this process.

Among the specific trends of further activities the president mentioned: The establishment of a common information field. The first step has already been performed as satellite TV broadcasts from Armenia for diaspora have started; A Development Agency, aimed at stimulating the economic activity in Armenia, in particular, by the Armenians living abroad; Holding regular cultural and sporting events, the Pan Armenian Games being a recent very successful example; The establishment of a youth center in

Armenia to operate on a regular basis. This will enable thousands of young Armenians to visit the Homeland every year.

Speeches were also delivered by Catholicosal Locum Tenens Arch. Nerses Pozapalian and His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Holy See of Cilicia.

Aram I noted in his speech that neither Armenia should dictate to the Diaspora nor vice versa while the two ought to decide what to do jointly.

Nagorno-Karabakh Republic President Arkady Ghoukassian said that the victory in the Karabakh war would have been impossible to gain without the contributions to it made by all the sections of the Armenian nation. Ghoukassian attached importance to victories in peacetime, i.e. to ensure economic improvements in Artsakh.

# **Aram I Will Not Run For Catholicos**

Yerevan, Armenia - His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Holy See of Cilicia has said he will not field his candidacy during this month's election of a new Catholicos of All Armenians.

Aram I said the next head of one of the world's oldest churches should be a native of Armenia, without endorsing any specific candidate.

"I am the Catholicos of the Holy See of Cilicia and I will remain as such, because I believe that it has an important mission in Diaspora," Aram said at a special news conference in Etchmiadzin. He said the main task of the next head of the Armenian church is to fight religious sects that are de-nationalizing and de-Christianizing Armenia.

### Armenia Marks 8th Anniversary Of Independence

Yerevan, Armenia - A military parade was held in Yerevan on Tuesday, Sept. 21, 1999, in celebration of the 8th anniversary of Armenian independence.

The march was attended by President Robert Kocharian, Prime Minister Vazgen Sarkisian and other Armenian leaders. In a message to the nation, Kocharian said that Armenia "Is pursuing an active policy of economic reforms, deepening democracy, promoting regional and global cooperation."

He spoke on the need to purposefully boost the country's potential, resolve socioeconomic problems and settle the Karabakh conflict.

Eight years ago, a referendum was held in Armenia in which the overwhelming majority of citizens voted for independence.

### UAF's 106th Airlift Delivers \$2 Million of Aid to Armenia

Glendale - The United Armenian Fund's 106th airlift arrived in Yerevan on Sept. 19, 1999, carrying \$2 million of humanitarian assistance

The UAF itself collected for this airlift \$670,000 worth of medicines

and medical supplies, including \$555,000 of Hepatitis A vaccines donated by the Catholic Medical Mission Board, for the Health Ministry of Armenia.

Since its inception in 1989, the UAF has sent \$263 million of humanitarian assistance to Armenia on board 106 airlifts and 537 sea containers.

### Armenia Prepares to Celebrate 1700th Anniversary of Adoption of Christianity

Yerevan, Armenia - The government committee set up to steer preparations for the celebration of the 1700th anniversary of the adoption of Christianity in Armenia led by prime minister Vazgen Sargissian, held its recurrent sitting Sept. 16, 1999. The committee approved the program of several events on that occasion, presented by Levon Mkrtchian, acting temporary head of the State Commission on Religion.

Exhibitions on Christian culture of Armenians, documentary films, performances, scientific conferences, historical and cultural monuments (especially monasteries and churches) and reconstruction are planned to carry out within the frames of the celebration. A monument to Forefather Noah is to be built near the Khor Virap monastery. This idea of the prime minister is already being realized. Money for the events will partially be allocated from the State budget, partially raised by the ecclesiastic committee.

The eligibility criteria for scholarships administered by the university vary according to the specifications of the individual donors who provide the funding for the program. The majority of scholarships are awarded on the basis of merit. Most scholarships are awarded annually and range from \$200 to \$4000. Applications are reviewed and award decisions are determined by various campus and community committees.

The deadline for applications for the 2000-2001 academic year is Nov. 19, 1999. Award decisions will be mailed to applicants in Spring 2000.

Applicants must be full-time students with a minimum 3.0 cumulative grade point average.

**Armenian Studies Scholarships:** 

Scholarships and grants are awarded annually to students who enroll in Armenian studies classes at Fresno State.

Beginning with the 2000-2001 academic year, the university will introduce a new four-year renewable scholarship. All students accepted into the Smittcamp Family Honors College will be designated President's Scholars and guaranteed a scholarship/grant award that covers the full cost of fees), the full costs of a room in University Housing and a \$200 book allowance.
