# Kouymjian Honored as "Man of the Year"

lifetime of work, dedication and achievement in Armenian studies earned Dr. Dickran Kouymjian, director of the Armenian Studies program at Fresno State, the Armenian National Committee's honor of "Man of the Year" at a banquet on Sunday, March 5.

The day, which Fresno City Mayor Jim Patterson proclaimed "Dr. Dickran Kouymjian Ph.D. Day," attracted much attention from friends, family and notables from around the world as well as a crowd of over three hundred people from the Fresno community who filled the Tor Nino's banquet hall.

"Being chosen 'Man of the Year' by the ANC tells me and my colleagues and staff that the work I and we have done is important enough to the community to acknowledge it and honor it," Kouymjian said.

Congratulatory letters were received from His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Great House of Cilicia, Archbishop Mesrob Moutafian, the Armenian Patriarch of Constantinople, and close colleagues and family members from other countries, all of whom wrote

to congratulate and acknowledge their respect for Dr. Kouymjian.

"Your contributions to the field of Armenian Studies is so great, that you are not only the "Man of this Year," but as a philologist-teacher-scholar, your works will for many years be a valuable and rich source for both Armenian and non-Armenian students," Archbishop Moutafian wrote of Dr. Kouymjian.

The afternoon began with some welcoming remarks by the master of ceremonies, Berj Apkarian, followed by an invocation by Fr. Vahan Gosdanian, Pastor of Holy Trinity Armenian Apostolic Church, and the singing of the Star Spangled Banner and Mer Hyrenik, the Armenian National Anthem, by Hygo Ohannessian.

A dozen special guests such as Mayor Patterson, City Council President Tom Boyajian, and others trying to gain support for their upcoming election were introduced.

Meher Chekerdemian, chairman of the ARF Tehlirian Gomideh, spoke of Dr. Kouymjian and his achievements. "Dr. Kouymjian single handily has brought attention to the Armenian culture by

establishing an Armenian Studies chair at Fresno State," Chekerdemian said.

Fresno State Associated Students President, Arakel Arisian, who was asked to speak by the ANC, commented about students' appreciation for Dr. Kouymjian's work.

"Fellow students say he is a brilliant man, he knows everything," Arisian said.

"He respects students, and students respect him.

"His contributions will remain in each individual who has taken his classes," Arisian said.

Dr. Kouymjian, in an emotional moment, addressed the previous speakers and the crowd.

"I am touched by the comments and letters," Kouymjian said. "I am very humbled that you honored me."

With a touch of modesty Dr. Kouymjian said, "Teaching and doing research is so much easier

# Yerevan State University Delegation Visits Fresno State for Three Weeks of Business Training

delegation of faculty and administrators from Yerevan State University, Armenia, headed by Rector (President) Dr. Radick Martirossian, arrived in Fresno on Sunday, February 27 for a threeweek working visit.

Accompanying the Rector are Dr. Grisha Gharibian, Dean of the Faculty of Business; Harutyun Marzpanyan, Associate Dean of the Faculty of Business; Amalia Saribekian, Professor of Business; Ashot Kakosyan, Professor of Business; and Hasmik Hovhanesyan, Lecturer in Business.

The group is in Fresno as part of a \$104,440 grant awarded to

Fresno State for the purpose of conducting a Faculty Development Program in Business and Economics with Yerevan State University (YSU) under the Newly Independent States (NIS) College and University Partnership Program.

Yerevan State University is the premiere university in Armenia and has achieved international recognition in many disciplines. The University was founded in 1919 and has a student population of about 10,000.

Project director Barlow Der Mugrdechian of the Fresno State Armenian Studies Program, welcomed the delegation at the airport, along with Fresno State Finance Professor Elizabeth Shields and interpreter Ashot Hagopian.

The group spent the first week

# McCain Remarks Spark Firestorm Over Genocide Resolution in House Staff reports

epublican Presidential candidate Sen. John McCain sparked controversy on Tuesday, February 29 when he said that he would not support a congressional resolution calling on the government of Turkey to acknowledge the 1915 Armenian Genocide. His remarks came at a town-hall meeting held in the North Gym on the California State University, Fresno campus. Many Armenian students and community members were in the estimated audience of over 1,500.

McCain's comments prompted a front-page article in the Fresno Bee on Wednesday March 1. He was quoted in the story as saying, "I will not support that resolution. I

### Armenian Summer Studies in Venice, Italy

he University of Venice will hold its fifteenth annual summer program in Armenian language, history and culture at the University of Venice in August. Dr. Dickran Kouymjian, Director of the Armenian Studies Program at CSU Fresno will teach intensive courses in Armenian art and in Armenian history. Fresno State students can register for CSUF credit for the program. A limited number of scholarships will be available through Armenian Studies to help pay travel expenses. The courses run from August 1 to 26, with a short course running from August 1-15. Tuition is \$550, lodging is \$585 for single rooms and \$425 for double or triple occupancy. There is a reduced price for the short course. Meals are paid for as you eat them in the University restaurant at approximately \$3.50 a meal.

H o v i g Torigian, a Kinesiology major, is working his first season as a


team manager for the Bulldogs.



### Ag Students From Armenia Study for Semester

fter several years of preparation by a team consisting of the United States Department of Agricultural (USDA), Fresno State University, College of Agricultural Science and Technology, Armenian Agricultural Academy (AAA), and the Armenian Studies Program, two exchange students from Armenian are finally here at Fresno State participating in the Armenian Agricultural Exchange Program.

Mihran Movsissyan, 18, and Sona Vardanyan, 19, are the first students to participate in this program. They were selected for their outstanding academic achievements and their English proficiency and were approved by the AAA and the US Department of Agricul-

The Armenian Agricultural Exchange Program is a campus partnership of the Armenian Studies Program, the College of Agricultural Sciences and Technology, and the International Programs office that is cooperating with the USDA to jointly sponsor these students. The aim is to expose students from Armenia on agricultural techniques and business so that they can take back to Armenia what they have learned and apply it. Fresno State was chosen to be involved in this exchange program because of the large Armenian community in the Central Valley and because it is in the center of the richest agricultural area in the world. In addition, a vibrant Armenian Studies Program with international ties is located at Fresno State.

Movsissyan and Vardanyan arrived in mid-January and will stay for a total of six months with all their expenses covered by the pro-

gram. They are living in dormitories with non-Armenian roommates and are getting a real taste of American culture.

Vardanyan's expectations were that the US would be a very

modern country where everything is easy. So far she is pleasantly surprised how easily people communicate with each other.

They both have six classes and take most of the saem classes. They are taking Introduction to Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Business Computer Applications, Agricultural Export marketing, Introduction to Armenian Studies, English as a Second Language, and a one-unit class in Contemporary American Culture that is required for all foreign exchange students.

They are enjoying their stay in America and say that people are treating them very well. Vardanyan said that it was difficult at first and she did not talk much, but now she is more comfortable and is opening up to people.

They both miss their family and friends in Armenia. Movsissyan said that his father might come to visit him in one month.

Their air-fare, health insurance, and room and board are being paid for by the USDA. The University is providing tuition-wavers,

while the College of Agricultural Science and Technology is paying all of their student fees and will attempt to find them summer jobs. The Armenian Studies Program is giving them each a scholarship that pays for books, supplies and miscellaneous living expenses.

Dr. William Rice of the Marketing Department at Fresno State headed the USDA-Fresno State-AAA project for nearly two years and was instrumental in the two students studying at Fresno State. From the time that the grant was first awarded, Professor Barlow Der Mugrdechian from the Armenian Studies Program and Professor John Shields from the Agricultural Economics department have been working closely with Dr. Rice to make this program successful. They have both made several trips to the AAA in Armenian in conjunction with the grant. The Student Exchange Program is initially depending on USDA grant money that in time will hopefully be replaced by an endowment to continue the program for many years.

Vardanyan plans to take the knowledge that she obtains in America back to Armenia, and would like graduate and work with food companies as a food economic

Movsissyan is interested in intentional trade and wants to become an export marketer.

They are the first students to participate in this program, and the program has had an excellent beginning.

In the future the exchange program plans to overcome the language barrier and have students go from America to Armenia. They will be looking towards the large Fresno Armenian community for help.

### Profile of Armenian Agricultural Exchange Program Students

Nineteen-year-old Sona Vardanyan from Aramous, Armenia is the middle child of three daughters. She graduated in 1997 and joined

## **Armenian Pilgrims Gather in Jerusalem to Celebrate Christmas**

he Year 2000 was ushered in with festivities throughout the world, but the millennial celebration of the Birth of Christ was celebrated with a unique series of events centered in the Holy City of Jerusalem. For Armenian Christians, these events took on an even greater significance, as the leadership of the Armenian spiritual and political worlds arrived in Jerusalem.

Armenian Christians in the Holy Lands are under the jurisdiction of the Armenian Patriarchate of Jerusalem. In Jerusalem Armenians celebrate New Year's Eve according to the old Julian calendar, so the equivalent of December 31/January 1 is celebrated on January 13/14. Likewise the Birth of Christ is celebrated on January 6 according to the newer Gregorian calendar, but on January 18 according to the older calendar.

My ten day visit to Jerusalem, January 10-January 20, spanned the millennial activities planned in the Holy Sites. In 1999, His Beatitude Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, Armenian Patriarch of Jerusalem had issued an invitation to Armenian Christians throughout the world to visit Jerusalem for the millennial celebration of Christ's birth. For the first time in history, a Catholicos of All Armenians, in this case His Holiness Karekin II, would be visiting the Holy Lands on Christmas. At the same time, the President of the Republic of Armenia, Robert Kocharian, was planning to arrive in Jerusalem on January 17 to participate in the celebrations and to become acquainted with the Armenians of the Old City.

Along with the visit of these leaders, the Patriarch of Constantinople, His Beatitude Archbishop Mesrob Moutafian was also leading a group of pilgrims from Turkey to the Holy Lands.

Christmas Eve was celebrated with singing in the courtyard of the St. James Monastery. The seminary students, the many clergy who had come from throughout the world, and the faithful gathered to sing "Glory to God in the Highest," followed by joyous celebrations that lasted well after midnight. The crisp, cool night, was punctuated with the sounds of fireworks.

The next morning, His Beatitude Archbishop Torkom Manoogian, received pilgrims from abroad in the second-floor reception room of the Patriarchate. He greeted the faithful and distributed the traditional oranges to the people.

On Monday, January 17, there was a feeling of anticipation in the air, as His Holiness Karekin II, Catholicos of All Armenians, was schedule to arrive at the Jaffa

Gate of the Old City of Jerusalem. He had been making his first pontifical visit to the Holy Land, arriving in Amman, Jordan several days earlier. He was escorted from Amman to Jerusalem by an convoy of cars, led by the Patriarch of Jerusalem.

By 4:00 PM in the afternoon, scouts from the local Homenetmen and Hoyetchmen clubs, with their colorful uniforms, had begun the official reception party. More than twenty bishops of the Armenian Church were in Jerusalem for the special events, and they too were in the procession to greet the Catholicos. Several thousand people had gathered at the Jaffa Gate to greet the Catholicos.

When the official delegation arrived, the sound of trumpets, bagpipes, and music rent the air, with much shouting and noise. The Catholicos was greeted by the two Patriarchs, and escorted from the Jaffa Gate to the St. James Monastery in a ceremonial procession which attracted the attention of many tourists. Upon entering the monastery, he entered the St. James Church, where he addressed the crowded faithful. Following the

message, the traditional achahampouyr took place.


It is hard to describe the feelings which were expressed and felt by the pilgrims from Turkey, Holland, from Europe, and the more than 400 Armenians from the United States, who had arrived for a very special occasion.

Armenian Christmas eve and Christmas day activities centered on the city of Bethlehem and the Church of the Grotto. The official convoy, headed by the Catholicos and the Patriarchs arrived at 11:00 AM and a Divine Liturgy was celebrated by His Holiness Karekin II at 4:00 PM in the afternoon. Following the Liturgy, the people had a chance to meet with His Holiness and the other clergy.

The highlight of the day was the midnight Divine Liturgy celebrated in the grotto where Jesus Christ was born. Attending the special ceremony were Robert Kocharian, President of the Republic of Armenia, and Yasser Arafat, Head of the Palestinian Authority.

The making of new acquaintances and visiting the holiest sites in Christianity, while at the same time participating in religious services with the Catholicos and two Patriarchs contributed to a special ten days filled with unforgettable moments.

# Weekend Class on Armenian Church Provokes Spirited Discussion

n the weekend of February 11 and 12, the Armenian Studies Program offered a one-unit course on the Armenian Church. Fifteen students attended this class with almost everybody realizing, after a short quiz was given to start the class, that they had more to learn about the Armenian Church. Students left the class much more informed on the Armenian Church.

The class was taught by Professor Barlow Der Mugrdechian, who is a Deacon in the Armenian Church and is very knowledgeable on the subject. He treated the students to lectures, slide-shows. movies and a guided tour of St. Paul Armenian Church. Discussions were also held about various controversial issues involving the Armenian Church and its future in America and abroad.

There were many controversial issues that

were discussed. The issues were whether the Church should focus on being more nationalistic or religious, the issue of celibacy of the clergy, the shortage of clergy, along with the effects of the Genocide on the Church, the split of the Church and the issue of language in the Armenian Church.

This article focuses on two issues: the split in the Armenian Church and language in the Armenian Church.

Armenians belong to many different Christian denominations;

however, this class focused on the original church in Armenia, the Armenian Apostolic Orthodox Church. Armenia adopted Christianity as its official religion in 301 AD. Prior to the Armenian Genocide, Protestant missionaries from England and America were able to convert some Armenians to other denominations.

Today, unfortunately, there exists a split in the Armenian Apostolic Churci. For example, the church in the United States is now under two jurisdictions; the Diocese which is affiliated with the Holy See of Etchmiadzin and the Prelacy affiliated with the Holy See of Cilicia. This is one of many current issues that affect the Armenian Church today.

The issue of the split in the Armenian Church in the United States has been a long-standing one (about seventy years). Since the election of a Catholicos Karekin I, and even before when His Holiness Vazken I was Catholicos in the Holy See of Etchmiadzin, there has been talk of unity. Unfortunately, unity has not even come close to occurring. Although attempts were made, neither side did anything to bridge the gap. Members of the Armenian Church would like the problem solved. A few of the students in the class recalled times when they were growing up, citing that talking to members of "the other side" was just not done. In fact, there was much hostility between the two sides. Now, people from each side interact socially all of the time. Among the younger generation, the split does not seem to harm any friendships from being made as they interact constantly and get along fine. The older generation has experienced the same feeling, patching up differences and not worrying about political differences that stem from the split of the Church. This interaction among the people of the Diocese and of the Prelacy seems to be a good start and hopefully a catalyst for the healing process to begin.

Another issue that was discussed in the class was the usage of the Classical Armenian language in the Armenian Church. In the world, there are Armenian Churches in Armenia, America, Canada, India, Brazil, Russia and France to name a few. The Armenian utilized in the church liturgy is different than the every-day spoken language of modern Armenian. Thus, even though Armenian is spoken in the church, it is not the type of Armenian language that is understood by the majority of Armenians around the world. Typically, only scholars use Classical Armenian and the numbers of people who understand it are very few. Sound confusing? This writer is also confused.

Not many people understand the spiritual message of the service unless following along in a book that has the translation in Modern Armenian or the language of choice. But, following along in a book takes away from the symbolism of the service.

There are a couple of solutions to this language barrier if one is a parishioner. First, the person can find a new church that utilizes a language that is understandable to him/her. Or second, the person can do research into the symbolism of the liturgy and memorize its importance and relevance. The first option seems to be a more popular choice these days.

The class differed in opinion on this issue in the Armenian Church in America. At least one person believed that the Armenian language must be preserved in the Armenian Church. However, the student also believed that the classical language should be replaced with the modern day language that is now spoken. Another student did not care whether the language was changed to English, although it might help, but that the congregation should be more involved in the service. For instance, the entire congregation should participate in the singing of the hymns by the choir, so that the congregation becomes more active rather than passive. It has been brought up by many people, mainly non-Armenian speakers that the liturgy should be entirely in English, or for that matter, the language of preference in the respective countries. So far, the leaders of the Armenian Church have ignored this issue stating that the church stay in accordance with tradition and keep the classical language intact during the liturgy.

The split in the Armenian Church continues to be a bane to the faithful of each church. With the approach of the celebration of the 1700th anniversary of the Christianization of Armenia looming near, a big celebration will occur in Armenia and also through-

than being honored."

Dr. Harold Haak, Director of the Maddy Institute and former Fresno State President, said, "He (Kouymjian) has been a distinguished researcher and scholar."

Dr. Kouymjian earned a BA in European history from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, a MA in Arab Studies from the American University of Beirut, and a Ph.D. in Armenian Studies from Columbia University in New York.

In 1977, Dr. Kouymjian was invited to Fresno to establish an Armenian Studies program at Fresno State. He also founded the Armenian student newspaper *Hye Sharzhoom* and the Center for Armenian Studies.

"Armenian Studies at California State University, Fresno is now an integral part of the curriculum because more than half a dozen courses are a part of the General Education Program," Kouymjian said. "More than 5,000 students of all ages have enrolled in our courses."

Dr. Kouymjian has taught a wide array of subjects from Armenian, Islamic, and Byzantine history and art, to film, Genocide and Saroyan Studies. The wide spectrum of courses the Armenian Studies Program offers is matched by no other program and are taken by both Armenians and non-Armenians.

Currently Dr. Kouymjian is preparing an exhibit and catalogue for the Catholicosate of Etchmiadzin on "Armenian Altar Curtains" which will be exhibited at the Textile Museum in Lyon, France in preparation for the 1700th anniversary of the establishment of Christianity in Armenia.

For the same Anniversary preparations at the request of Catholicos Aram I, Dr. Kouymjian is preparing an exhibit and cata-

logue titled "The Treasures of the Cilician Catholicosate" for the Museum of Art and History in Geneva, Switzerland.







### General Andranik Reburied in Armenia

About 20,000 Armenians turned out for the reburial of general Ozinian Andranik, a leader of the Armenian resistance to the Ottoman army in the early 1900s, whose remains were brought back Friday after resting more than 71 years in Paris' Pere Lachaise cem-

Armenian Primate Karekin II officiated at a service at his residence in Echmiadzin, west of the capital, in memory of the general, who died in exile in California in 1927, aged 62.

After the mass, Andranik's body was taken in a funeral procession through Yerevan, with 20,000

people, including President Robert Kotcharian and other political leaders, participating. Andranik was reburied in the city's Yerablour cemetery, the resting place of Armenian officers killed during the 1988-1994 Nagorny Karabakh conflict with neighboring Azerbaijan. Nagorny Karabakh is a self-proclaimed Armenian Republic on Azerbaijani territory. More than 20,000 people have died and nearly a million were displaced since the ethnic Armenian majority there rebelled in 1988.

Andranik's tomb is adjacent to that of the late prime minister Vazguen Sarkissian, assassinated in parliament during an attempted coup d'etat on October 27, 1999.

Before Armenia's indepen-

dence in 1991, the Soviet authorities had refused to let Andranik's body be repatriated.

### Armenia Aid Set at \$75 million

The Administration's proposed budget figures would decrease U.S. aid to Armenia to \$75 million, down from over \$102 million in fiscal year 2000. At the same time, the White House proposes increasing aid to Azerbaijan by more than 77%, from \$30 million in fiscal year 2000 to \$54 million in fiscal year 2001. Section 907 of the Freedom Support Act, which restricts U.S. aid to the government of Azerbaijan, allows for certain types of democracy, human rights, trade development and humanitarian as-

# McCain Pulls Out of Republican Race after Losing California Primary

think that it is terrible what happened. I condemn it." He later added, "It was not under this government in Turkey. I don't see what this resolution does to improve the situation one iota."

The resolution referred to is House Resolution 398 (on the Armenian Genocide), introduced by Fresno Congressman George Radanovich (R-CA) and Minority Whip David Bonior (D-M), which establishes the U.S. record on the Armenian Genocide and calls upon the President to 1) ensure that U.S. diplomats dealing with human rights are educated about the Armenian Genocide and 2) to properly characterize the Armenian Genocide as a "genocide" in the President's annual April 24th ad-

Richard Sanikian, a member of the Armenian National Committee of Fresno, posed the question regarding the Genocide to McCain. Sanikian noted that Senator McCain had failed to make his position clear on the Armenian Genocide.

McCain's response rejected support for passage of the Armenian Genocide resolution but did call for reparations for the victims.

Later on Tuesday, at a press conference following the talk, McCain expanded on his response earlier in the day to a question on the Armenian Genocide, characterizing - for the first time - the crime against humanity as an act of "genocide," but again voicing his opposition to Congressional Armenian Genocide legislation, reported the Armenian National Committee of America (ANCA). McCain fielded questions from the media on the Armenian Genocide. His response, broadcast on the 11:00 p.m. newscast on KJEO Channel 47 in Fresno, was that: "It was not carried out by the present Turkish government. It was carried out by other people. And I am in deep

sympathy for one of the greatest acts of genocide ever committed by a previous Turkish government against innocent people. It's one of the most terrible tragedies in history. I will not support this resolution which is condemning the present Turkish government."

Senator McCain's history of opposing legislation commemorating the Armenian Genocide dates back to his days as a U.S. Representative. Through his years in the House, he worked against successive legislative initiatives to mark April 24th as a day of remembrance for the victims of the Armenian Genocide. As a U.S. Senator, he voted in 1990 against Senator Bob Dole's Armenian Genocide reso-

The Armenian Assembly ear-

lier in the week reported that in a strongly-worded letter to two prominent Armenian-American supporters, Republican Presidential candidate George W. Bush recognized the Armenian Genocide, called on "all decent people" to "remember and acknowledge" this event, and pledged to ensure that the United States "properly recognizes the tragic suffering of the Armenian people" if elected President. Also, Bush cited the Armenian Diaspora and the independent Republic of Armenia as examples of the "resiliency of the Armenian people." He called on the United States to back the independence of the Caucasus nations by supporting the peaceful resolution of regional disputes and regional economic development. He said that although the US can act as a mediator, clearly, a lasting peace in the Caucasus region must be negotiated by the parties involved. Bush expressed his full support for American assistance to Armenia, the promotion of democracy, the rule of law and a free and open society.

out the Diaspora. The Diaspora consists of all the Armenian Churches not including Armenia. But with the separation of the church in the United States, it seems hard to celebrate. The churches are exactly the same in terms of their theology, yet political differences and leadership quarrels have kept them apart. Only small attempts have been made to heal the split in the Church. If the leaders of the Diocese and the Prelacy put as much effort into healing the division in the Church as they have planning this celebration of Armenia's Christianity, the celebration might actually have real meaning to it. It is ironic to consider ourselves as Christians, and yet not forgive each other for past transgressions.

The language issue in the Church is yet to be resolved. Some

others are not. Basically, the fear of changing the language is that the Church would no longer be universal. Certain countries would worship in different languages than others. This scares some people in the Church because they want every Church to be the same and that includes the language that the liturgy is celebrated in. However, this problem should not be handled in this way. Changing the language will not change the essence of the church; it will only change the feelings of people toward the Church. Peoples who do not speak Classical Armenian, whether they are Armenian or non-Armenian will be able to appreciate the religious beliefs expressed through the liturgy.

The Armenian Church has many widely debated issues. It is my hope that 1,700 years of wisdom can guide it through these obUS Premiere Tour of the Italian Documentary

Destination Nowhere: the Witness is documentary on the Armenian Genocide. It depicts Armin Wegner's personal testimony to the Armenian Genocide in the Syrian deserts where he served as an Austrian officer in 1915-16. Wegner photographed the destruction of Armenians in the deserts of Der Zor, and his photographs provide some of the most powerful images we have of the Armenian Genocide. The documentary was shot in Italy, Armenia, and Syria. Armin Wegner was recently honored at the Armenian Genocide museum for championing the plight of Armenians till the end of his life. "Destination Nowhere: the Witness," which is dubbed into English, was shown in London last year to great acclaim.

Dr. Martin Rooney is a specialist on Armin Wegner and the Armenian Genocide. He is the founding member of the Armin Wegner Society in Germany. His published works include several articles and translations on the Armenian Genocide. His talk will engage Armin Wegner and the role of Germany in the documentation, as well as denial, of the Armenian Genocide.
